# Family Immigration = The Cornerstone of US Immigration Law

Allows U.S. citizens and lawful permanent residents to apply for certain relatives to become lawful permanents in the U.S.

### **FAMILY-BASED PROCESS**

- Part 1
  - USC or LPR files "relative petition" (form I-130) showing status as USC or LPR and relationship to family member
  - USC or LPR is "petitioner" and family member is "beneficiary"
- Part 2
  - Family member seeking status files application for residency: adjustment of status or consular processing
  - Family member is "applicant"

### Who Can Petition for Whom?

### **US Citizens may petition for:**

- Spouse
- Minor unmarried child
- Parent
- Adult unmarried child
- Adult married child
- Sibling

### LPR's may petition for:

- Spouse
- Minor unmarried child
- Adult unmarried child
