ABA Formal Opinion 498

- Virtual Practice = Beyond the traditional brick & mortar law firm
- Competence
- Diligence
- Communications (especially when using technology)
- Confidentiality
- Supervision

ABA Formal Opinion 498

- In general, same ethical rules apply to both traditional and virtual practice
- If you are prohibited from doing it in person, you are still prohibited if virtual
- Are your technology and work environment consistent with your ethical obligations?
- In some instances, ethical obligations may be more, not less

Lawyer Wellness Statistics*

- 32% of lawyers 30 years old or younger have a drinking problem
- 28% of lawyers struggle with some level of depression
- 19% of lawyers demonstrate symptoms of anxiety
