Introduction - what we'll cover

Federal Law Enforcement Agencies' identities help identify nature of investigation

Vital to Identify agency, unit & location (plus AUSA & senior agency)

- Different agencies have different investigative jurisdictions
- FBI probably has broadest jurisdiction of federal agencies
- Joint Task Forces with DPS, local law enforcement, multiple agencies (e.g., narcotics, organized crime, terrorism)
- Federal agents have arrest, search & seizure powers (but n duties) of Texas peace officers:
 - Tex. Code of Crim. P. Art. 2.122 ("powers of arrest and search and as to") most agents have powers for felonies only, some have then Texas offense
