ENFORCEMENT UPDATE -- SFC v. Vizio

- New lawsuit against Vizio
- Software Freedom Conservancy filed a lawsuit in October 2021 against Vizio, claiming violation of the GPL and LGPL for SmartCast TVs.
- Breach of contract, and declaratory relief
- In November 2021, Vizio moved to remove to federal court





ENFORCEMENT UPDATE -- SFC v. Vizio

- Previous open source cases have all been copyright infringement, this is a breach of contract claim
- No authors are plaintiffs in the suit
- Pleads for specific performance of GPL conditions
- Contrary to all prior enforcement theories

ENFORCEMENT UPDATE -- SFC v. Vizio

Conditions and Covenants

- Open source licenses are conditional copyright licenses
- Rights are granted from the author (copyright owner) to each recipient
- If the conditions (notice, source code offer) are violated, the license terminates and the user becomes a copyright infringer
- Source code offer conditions have historically not been considered covenants
- Specific performance is usually not available for covenants
