

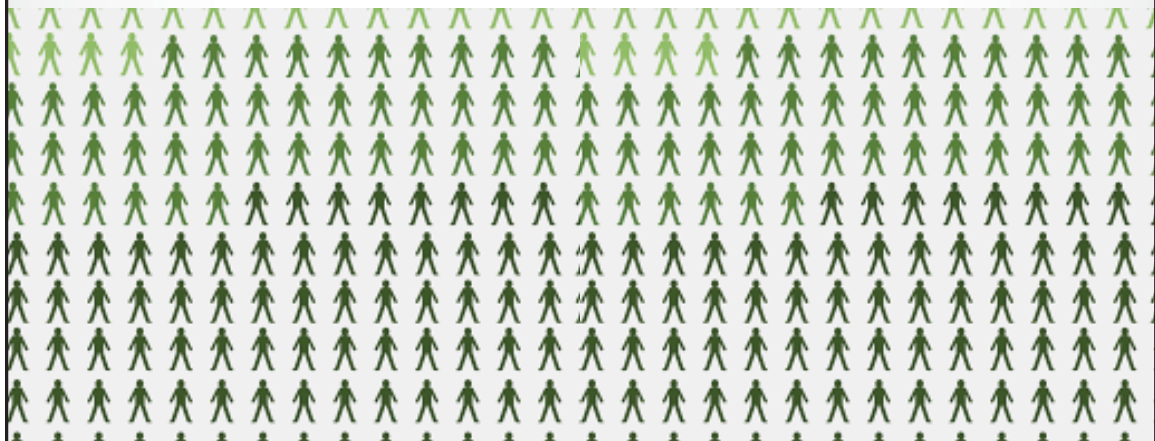
Access to Justice and Professional Responsibility

Preamble

- “A lawyer is a public citizen having special responsibility for the quality of justice”
- “A lawyer should seek improvement of the law, access to the legal system, the administration of justice, and the quality of legal services rendered by the legal profession.”
- “A lawyer should be mindful of deficiencies in the administration of justice and of the fact that the poor and sometimes persons who are not poor, cannot afford adequate legal assistance.”

Rule 6.1 ABA Model Rules of Professional Conduct

- “A lawyer should aspire to render at least 50 hours of pro bono public legal services per year” and that “a substantial majority of the 50 hours” should be to persons of limited means or to organizations that support the needs of persons of limited means.
- ABA 2013 Supporting Justice III study found that the average annual amount of service provided by attorneys was 56.5 hours, with a median of 30 hours per year.
